Reporting verbs are verbs of saying or believing such as agree, announce, believe, claim, consider, expect, hope, know, report, say, suggest, think, understand, etc. And we can use their passive form for distancing in two different ways. PASSIVE OF REPORTING VERBS / IMPERSONAL PASSIVE Verbs that refer to saying or thinking (think, believe, say, report, know, consider, presume, hope...) are often followed by a to-infinitive form in the passive. Example: The police thinkhe isin Argentina.

PASSIVE OF REPORTING VERBS IMPERSONAL PASSIVE

These two different ways of using verbs are known as voices. In everyday writing, the active voice is much more common than the passive. The passive tends to be used in formal documents such as official reports or scientific papers, often where an action or situation is regarded as more significant than who or what did or caused it:
